We have established our 4th overseas branch office in Vietnam this year and schemed to increase the amount of our sponsored children in our overseas branch offices yearly. TFCF will step forward to the 65th year in 2015. I can’t thank you all enough, our TFCF sponsors, donors, volunteer groups, the government and private enterprises, for the way you’ve made what TFCF is with your supports. I also thank for our board members’ trust and the efforts made by all directors and staffs. It’s my commitment that I will strive to shape our services locally and globally and keep TFCF moving forward in the future.

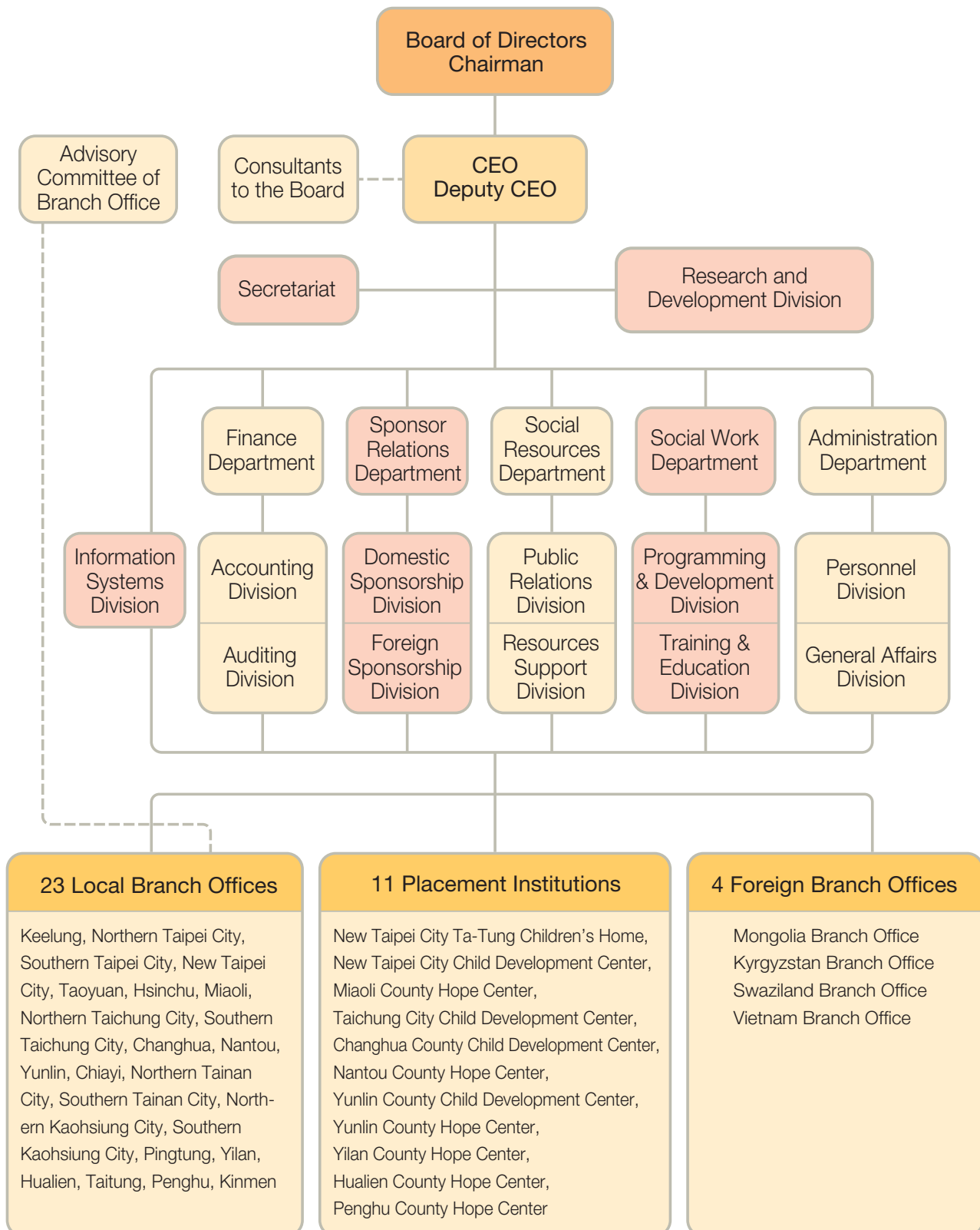

Brief History

- 1938 China's Children Fund (CCF) was established in Richmond, Virginia, by Christians in the States.
- 1950 Established Children's Cottage Home, Kwang-In as the 1st family-style orphanage in Taiwan setting the foundation for our services and programs, later took over by Ta-Tung Children's Home.
- 1964 Established the 1st field office in Taichung and 23 Family Helper Projects (now called Branch Offices) to provide services for children and families in Taiwan.
- 1985 CCF/Taiwan became fully independent from Christian Children's Fund and no longer received financial support from foreign donors.
- 1987 Organized Foreign Children Sponsorship Program and sponsored children in Asia, America, and Africa. Launched Child Protection Services firstly in Taiwan.
- 2002 Changed our name to Taiwan Fund for Children and Families (TFCF). Joined ChildFund Alliance to expand our services and help more needy children worldwide.
- 2003 Awarded with 2003 Sun Award, the highest reward of Presidential Culture Prize on the promotion of social welfare.
- 2004 Established Mongolia Branch Office as our 1st overseas Branch Office.
- 2005 Awarded with 2005 Best Social Welfare Foundation from Ministry of the Interior.
- 2006 Awarded with 2006 Social Education Promotion Award from Ministry of Education.
- 2008 Awarded with 2008 Best Social Welfare Foundation from Ministry of the Interior. Started providing our services in China.
- 2009 Awarded with 2009 Sustainable NGO Award from Executive Yuan. Awarded with the Certificate of Appreciation for Helping Typhoon Morakot Relief Work from Ministry of the Interior.
- 2010 Awarded with 8th Excellent Award for Advancing Cross-Strait Relations from Mainland Affairs Council. Entrusted by Ministry of the Interior for 1957 Welfare Information Line and 1996 Hotline of Interior Affairs services.
- 2011 Awarded with 2011 Best Social Welfare Foundation from Ministry of the Interior. Awarded with the Certificate of Appreciation for Fundraising Japan 311 Earthquake Relief Work from Ministry of the Interior.
- 2012 Established Kyrgyzstan Branch Office as our 2nd overseas Branch Office.
- 2013 Established Swaziland Branch Office as our 3rd overseas Branch Office. Initiated April 28th as Child Protection Day to give widespread attention to child protection issues in Taiwan.
- 2014 Awarded with 2014 Best Social Welfare Foundation from Ministry of Health and Welfare. Established Vietnam Branch Office as our 4th overseas Branch Office. TFCF officially withdrew from ChildFund Alliance with effect from January 1, 2015.

On August 6, 2014, TFCF held an annual ceremony for Golden Support Award. There were 4 award recipients who are TFCF self-reliant youths with excellent performance in their careers. One of the best Taiwan singers, Ms. Julia Peng and other 3 recipients shared their

Happy 10th Birthday to TFCF Doll

From August to September, TFCF has held a TFCF Doll Exhibition to show diverse dolls to the public respectively in

Yilan City and Taichung City. The exhibit features dolls are designed by TFCF. Each doll does a "Give Me Five" pose

and dresses locally based on the region of our Branch Offices.

This exhibition introduced 25 TFCF Branch Offices' representative dolls and conveyed the concerns about vulnerable children and youth. We hoped to encourage children and youth to show confidence and gave them a cheer. Through the doll show, we also expected that there would be more people paying attentions to the child welfare and public issues.



Sponsor Visit in Kyrgyzstan

A total of 38 sponsors flew 7000 miles away to meet their sponsored children in Kyrgyzstan along with Mr. Li-Min Chao (Standing Board Member), Mr. Ching-Fu Chen (Standing Board Member), Mr. Kun-I Huang (Board Member) and our CEO Ms. Betty Ho. We invited Ms. Kimi Hsia who received 2011 Golden Bell Awards of the best host in a

variety programme to be our Friendship Representative in this annual gathering. It was an amazing visit and all sponsors and children did get over the language barrier and hold each other's hands during the gathering. For many years, Taiwan sponsors and TFCF have helped many

children become self-reliant and been helpful of Taiwan's overseas diplomatic presence.



TFCF Out of Poverty Campaign - Poverty Experience



On Oct 18, 2014, TFCF held a campaign and invited families, students, and individuals to

participate and experience poverty through the campaign. We introduced our five programs on ending poverty: Livelihood Support, Health Care, Scholarship Fund, Emergency Relief Fund and Self-Reliant Program for Youth. We aimed to call for the public and the government to work together with us to achieve the

Millennium Development Goals to end poverty. The United Nations' (UN) International Day for the Eradication of Poverty has been observed on October 17 annually since 1993. Poverty issue is one of our focuses and we hope to help more needy families to escape from extreme poverty and improve their living environment.



News Highlights

Taiwan Database of Children and Youth in Poverty – The Panel Study in 2014

TFCF has proposed research that address the difficulties of Children and Youth in Poverty with long-term follow-up investigation since 2008. Through the survey, we've found out three major areas which may impact to all-round development of vulnerable children and youth potentially including eating disorder, educational resources distributed unequally, and reducing help-seeking from teachers.

Public may reach the data through the web site of TFCF

or Academia Sinica and we expect more people to pay attention to issues of Children

and Youth in Poverty and help on the children welfare for a better tomorrow.



Top 10 Worst Child Abused News

On Dec. 10, 2014, we held a press conference on revealing 10 worst child abused cases in Taiwan. There were 18,530 abused cases reported in the first half of the year. Based on the data we collected, we noticed that the age of the abused children were getting

younger which 49% of them were under 2 years old. Except for the typical family caregivers, the chances for those people who became the abusers were also getting higher, including co-habitants, friends, babysitters, under-aged children and day caregivers. Through the press conference, we provided the following steps to prevent any tragedies:

- (1) Carefully choose the caregiver and do not leave kids home alone.
- (2) Immediately report any abused issues.
- (3) Fully protect the children's right to survival.
- (4) Directly call at TFCF hotline: 0800-078585 whenever you need help.

Domestic Children Sponsorship Program

Taiwan Fund for Children and Families (TFCF) is the first non-profit organization in Taiwan launching the Domestic Children Sponsorship Program. TFCF provides needy children with financial assistances and opportunities to continue their education through sponsorship programs, scholarship and emergency relief fund. Our social workers track the authentic situation of each needy child and his/her family through home visits, interviews and various activities in a regular term and provide them with services that meet their needs best.

Up to the end of December 2014, there were 51,364 enrolled children (including children at Ta-Tung Children's Home) in the domestic children sponsorship programs. The services in the program include:

1. Educational Sponsorship

We have started to offer an extra Educational Sponsorship to those enrolled children who were in need since November, 1992. The sponsorship has been applied to all enrolled children since March, 2008 in reaction to the high living standard in Taiwan. At the end of 2014, 51,044 out of 51,364 enrolled children received the educational sponsorship.

2. Program Sponsorship

(1) Early Intervention Sponsorship

Numbers of physical and mental disabled with delayed development children are increasing. TFCF has started its early intervention sponsorship since 1998. Up till the end of December 2014, this program helped 186 children in need.

(2) Talent/Skill Sponsorship

The service has started since January 1999 and the goal is to help those who cannot financially afford to develop their talents and skills. In order to effectively provide integrated services, we gradually substitute some talent/skill sponsorship cases with the family sponsorship. Therefore, by the end of December 2014, only 13 of our enrolled children received the talent/skill sponsorship.

(3) Family Sponsorship

This sponsorship program is established to help those families who have financial problems and have been excluded from the social benefits network provided by our government. This pilot program was implemented first at two of our Branch Offices: Southern Taichung City Branch Office and Nantou Branch Office. It has been later carried out at all branch offices since January 2009 to help the needy families empower themselves to deal with all kinds of difficulties and crises. A total of 12,367 enrolled children were assisted under this program at the end of 2014 which increased by 4,409 children comparing with that of the previous year.

3. Permanent Sponsorship

A one-time donation with NT\$200,000 to contribute fund to children's sponsorships or related sponsorship programs is called Permanent Sponsorship. This sponsorship, consisting of 5 programs, has begun since September 2004. The 5 programs includes "Early Intervention Program", "Shelter

Service for Abused Children and Youth”, “Placement Service for Needy Children and Youth”, “Program for Aboriginal Children” and “Program for Children and Youth with Mental Trauma”. At the end of December 2014, the total of permanent sponsors was up to 4,296. The number for the permanent sponsors’ funding has accumulated to 5,063 donations which 3,046 donations were to sponsor 808 children and 2,017 to the above 5 programs in our 21 branch offices.

4. Institution Sponsorship

TFCF has set up 5 Child Development Centers to provide Early Intervention Services in New Taipei, Taichung, Changhua and Yulin Branch Offices and Ta-Tung Children’s Home. TFCF also established 8 Hope Centers to provide Placement Services in Miaoli, Taichung, Nantou, Yilan, Hualien and Penghu Branch Offices and Ta-Tung Children’s Home.

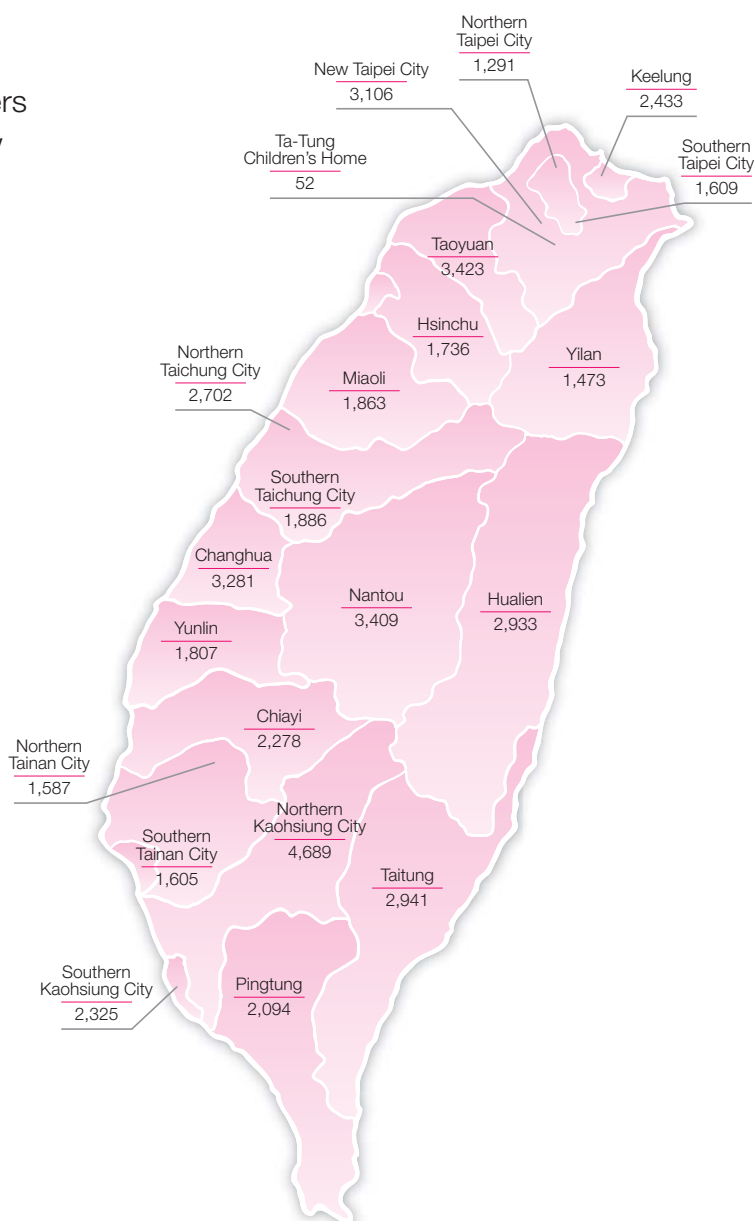

In Taitung Branch Office, a “Dormitory with Hope” was set up for the placement of the youths. In 2014 we introduced the Institution Sponsorship Program to obtain more steady financial support from the public for these institutions. By December 2014, there were 3,728 sponsors offering 4,813 sponsorships to the institutions.

Child Protection

Child/Youth Protection Program

Children and youth are the bright future of the country. In 2014, our branch offices provided assistances and consultations to 3,975 abused children/youth. In order to prevent the children/youth from being abused, TFCF has been providing the Child/Youth Protection Program since 1987 in response to the demand. Our Child/Youth Protection Program includes:

- **Family Treatment Service and Long-Term Follow-up Consultation Service:** We provide the necessary support, assistance, and actively maintain/ re-establish family functioning. We also help the abused children and youth to successfully grow up in a proper and safe care and protection and effectively prevent any child and youth from being abused again.
- **Livelihood Support and Health Care:** We provide financial and in-kind assistance, house care, household duties, day care and medical care and improve the lives of families



by utilizing social resources and volunteer manpower.



- **Mental Trauma Rehabilitation Service:**

We provide parenting education, family/play therapy, individual/group consultation and home visits.

- **Medical Service:** We provide immediate medical care to the children and youth. In addition, if the abuser or the caregiver have problems with alcoholism, drug addiction or mental disease problems, TFCF will help refer to a medical unit for further assistance.

- **Parent Education Service:** We conduct Parenting Counseling under government commission and provide parent education seminars and fun activities to help parents learn the correct concept of parenting education, child care and protection to enhance its substantive capacity. In 2014, we served a total of 212 parents which were commissioned by the Government.







- **Consulting and legal services:** In 2014, we responded a total of 1,637 enquiries including phone calls, in person, written mail/ email, Internet and other forms of advice. We also help reply child/youth protection issues and provided related information through transferring to other legal services.

- **Child/Youth Protection Prevention Service:** In 2014, we held 301 nationwide campaigns to prompt the concept of child/youth protection. We believe that preventive education is the most fundamental of advocacy work.





Institutional Placement Service

TFCF provides the qualified Institutional Placement Service (collectively, the “Hope Center”) for child and youth who suffer from abuse or neglect, violate the law or need to protect. We help the children and youth with these high-quality placement counseling services according to different needs of children and juveniles.

TFCF has established 7 Hope Centers to place the children, youth and girls who are mistreated. Our services include “Placement Service for Abused Children and Youth”, “Emergent or Long-Term Placement Service for Needy Teenage Girls” and “Placement Service for Juvenile Delinquents Referred by the Court”. Through the services, we hope to help them feel more confident in the future.

● Placement Service for Abused Children and Youth

In 2014, we helped place 169 abused children and youths. Based on their characters and needs, the services we provided include accommodations, life counseling, medical care, psychological counseling and therapy, educational and career counseling, family function restoration, recreational activities and parent-child interaction.

● Emergent or Long-Term Placement Service for Needy Teenager Girls

Entrusted by our government in July 1996, TFCF started to provide emergent or long-term placement service for needy teenage girls in Hualien Branch Office. We provided the service to 19 girls in 2014. We provided accommodation service and security protection, life counseling and education, arrangement of medical services and health education counseling, reconstruction and counseling of family relationships and psychological counseling and treatment.



● Placement Service for Juvenile Delinquents Referred by the Court

In 1988, TFCF initially provided placement service for juvenile delinquents referred by Taiwan Nantou District Court. In 2014, we

helped 38 juvenile delinquents and provided individual/family consultation, mental trauma counseling, education/career counseling, medical assistance, recreation activity, accommodation and legal service.



High Risk Family Program

Children belonging to High Risk Families are more vulnerable than their counterparts, to develop problems. It is important hence to identify these families and intervene at an early stage in order to prevent problems in the children. TFCF High Risk Family Program is under government commission and focuses on children/youths' families which face marital issues, family conflicts, children/youths cares, mental disorders, alcohol/drug addicts, suicidal individuals etc.

We had intensive visits to those families and provided related services to effectively deliver assistances. We also help families deal with crisis and enable families to recover and improve their family functions. It ensures that the children/youths in physiological,

psychological, emotional, educational, cultural and spiritual development will be well developed in a safe environment.

In 2014, there were 13 Branch Offices undertaking the High Risk Family Program which happened in Taipei city, New Taipei city, Taichung city, Nantou county, Chiayi city, Tainan City, Kaohsiung city, Yilan county, Hualien county, and Kinmen county. There were 2,240 families benefitted from this program in 2014. We hope to help reduce hardship for those high risk families through our various services.

Foster Care Program

TFCF started Foster Care Program since 1981 and it's been in service for 34 years and implanted in 23 TFCF branch offices in Taiwan. In 2014, the number of children increasing in foster care was up to 709 children and 100 new families joined Foster Care Program. In 2014, there were 2,209 children and youth receiving Foster Care Program which in average 937 families per month provided the service to help children/youth with psychological trauma and help them stay in a home-like place to grow in strength. In 2014, 1,499 foster children per month have been served.

Foster care service is a temporary placement service and expect to assist children and youth to be healthy before returning home. According to this year's statistics, there were 779 children and youth ending up in foster care. Most of

the children and youth stayed in foster families for about 1~2 years in average. It is the most important objective to see children and youth return to their biological families while the family functions rebuild.





TFCF promotes its foster family services from January to March every year to recruit new families to provide the services. In 2014, there were only 100 households who met the requirement and became foster families. TFCF provided training courses to them in order to have more complete and professional services. Through the trainings, we help foster families



improve and enhance the quality of child care, and bring more appropriate services for foster children and youth continually.



Early Intervention Program

In order to better assist developmental delay children receiving in time care during critical period, TFCF started Early Intervention Program since 1996 integrating with other professional social welfare groups to provide completed services and courses, including medical care, education, day care, home-based early intervention and consultations.

The Program is divided into three categories:

- (1) Case Management is implemented in Changhua & Yunlin Child Development Centers and Ta-Tung Children's Home.







Based on the child's situation, he/she will receive the medical treatment. In 2014, we served 1,312 children in our Case Management.

(2) Day Care Service is implemented in New Taipei City, Taichung City, Changhua and Yunlin Child Development Centers and Ta-Tung Children's Home. The child will receive individual training course. In 2014, we served 1,586 children in Early Intervention Program.

(3) Center-based & Home-based Interventions are implemented after being evaluated by the professional team. They will determine the most suitable way of treatment for the children. In 2014,

we served respectively 85 children for Home-based intervention and 189 children for Center-based intervention per month in average.



Service for the Needy

TFCF has launched the services for needy children/youth/families since 1950. We aim to make substantial changes in the lives of impoverished children and their families and end the cycle of poverty. In order to help our sponsored children become self-reliant, TFCF provides:

- **Financial Supporting Program:**

- (1) Sponsorship Program: In addition to the Sponsorship Program, we have begun our Family Sponsorship Program since 2008
- (2) Scholarships and Student Aids: We provide different kinds of scholarships to students from elementary schools to universities.





(3) Emergent Relief Fund: We provide funds to help those who suffer from unexpected incident.

- **Counseling Service:** It includes group counseling and school adjustment & tutoring.
- **Recreational Services:** This is for inspiring our children to develop the capacity on innovation and creativity with a positive attitude.
- **Sponsors & Sponsored Children Union Event:** We hold the event annually in order to help them get to know each other.



- **Capacity Building Program:** The program includes Head Start, Youth Capacity Building, Jumpstart Program and Parents' Career Development.
- **Children Supporting Program:**
 - (1) Parentification Program: We have begun to provide the program since 2012 to help children between 6-15 years old. There are 1,183 children benefit from the program.





(2) Nutrition Program: We help children from pre-school to high school.

(3) Grant for Pre-School Children: We have provided the Grant for Pre-School Children since 2009. We aim to reduce the financial burden for those needy families.

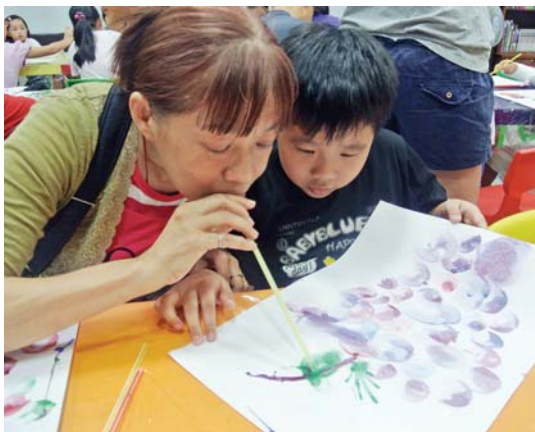
(4) Improving Learning Program: Provide our disadvantaged children the opportunity to

attend after-school class/care. Through the interaction with others, it helps children build self-confidence and self-esteem.

● **Good Neighbor Support Plan:**

(1) Love in Suspended Stores: In June, 2013, we launched the "Love in Suspended Stores". Some restaurateur volunteer and show their kindness by providing free meals





to disadvantaged groups. Now, there are more than 200 compassionate stores joining this plan and they have provided over 189,872 meals to people in need.

- (2) We connected our 8 branch offices and 15 external organizations to open food banks in north, middle and south regions in Taiwan. The food banks distribute food and other daily necessities every month to more than 1000 needy and disadvantage people.

In 2014, TFCF helped 27,194 families including 51,312 children and youth with those livelihood supports. We insist on helping them improve their lives and opportunities to become self-reliant. By the end of the year, 6,364 children/youth become self-reliant which made an accumulative total up to 189,411 people.

Sponsorship and Service through NGO Partners

In July 1987, TFCF launched “Foreign Children Sponsorship Program” regardless of race, religion or gender. Through working with the international coalition of ChildFund Alliance, there were 65,042 foreign children under TFCF’s sponsorship



program at the end of 2014. In Taiwan, our sponsors make a donation of NT\$700 monthly to help with children’s growth and development needs in 37 countries. Child-focused and community-

based projects are designed to help improve their lives. Services relating to the nutrition/medical care, environmental improvement, education and livelihood support are TFCF typical programs which would directly impact children’s livelihood.

In 2008, TFCF started providing our services in China due to the earthquake on May 12, 2008. We

provided professional training on the post-quake relief program in Shaanxi Province, including family support program, livelihood adaptation service for children, the mental counseling service, house reconstruction, community

relocation and job & skill trainings. We have continually provided program and cooperated with the local organization, Shaanxi Gender Development Solution to help those children and families in need since 2012.

TFCF Overseas Branch Offices

TFCF has dedicated to support vulnerable groups in the society and provided them with care services timely. In addition to helping needy children and families in Taiwan, TFCF gradually expands to become an international organization to better lives for more needy children and families overseas. We insist “Where there is a child in need, there is TFCF”.

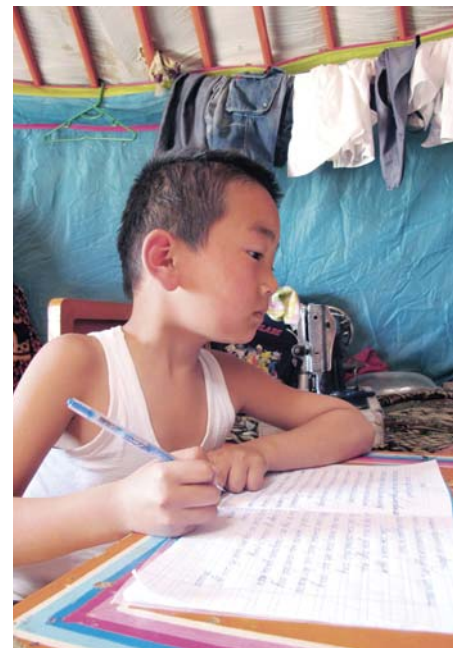
In 2004, TFCF started our sponsorship program abroad and established the first overseas Branch Office in Mongolia. Afterwards, we established three more overseas Branch Offices in Kyrgyzstan (2012), Swaziland (2013) and Vietnam (2014).

In 2014, TFCF helped 65,042 foreign children, of which 15,966 children were sponsored by our 4 overseas Branch Offices. It

has been our goal to be a good Samaritan to help more needy children and families around the world.

1. Mongolia Branch Office

TFCF Mongolia Branch Office was approved and officially established in September 2004 and has provided sponsorship program since January 2005. At the end of December 2014,





TFCF helped 13,170 Mongolian needy children, and of which 4,732 children have become independent. There are 8,438 children who are still receiving our assistance.

TFCF has directly implemented programs in Mongolia for 10 years from Ulan Bator (the Capital City) to other remote areas. In addition to financial assistance, TFCF focuses on sustainable development of community programs, such as TFCF Village community management program, water supply stations, preschool education and medical care services in remote areas.

Through the collaboration with N. Gendenjamts's Memorial Mongolian Maternal and Child Health Research Centre (MMCHRC), we have provided services to the children with cleft lip and palate in remote areas since 2010.





2. Kyrgyzstan Branch Office

TFCF Kyrgyzstan Branch Office was officially established in August 2012. TFCF has provided the sponsorship program in Kyrgyzstan since December 2011. By the end of December 2014, TFCF helped 4,736 Kyrgyzstan disadvantaged children.



Kyrgyzstan Branch Office is located in Tokmok, the administrative seat of Chui Province and the third largest city in the northern region, about 62 kilometers from the capital city Bishkek. The

services provided by TFCF in Kyrgyzstan include home visits, food supply, family fund, utility fund, sanitary supply, parenting advocacy, life counseling and emergency relief fund. TFCF also provides needy children with long-term financial assistance, nutrition, medical aid, education support, and life skill trainings.





3. Swaziland Branch Office

In order to provide our services to help better children's lives in Swaziland, TFCF Swaziland Branch Office was approved and officially established in July 2013. We have provided the sponsorship program in Swaziland since August 2013. By the end of December 2014,

TFCF helped 2,665 Swaziland disadvantaged children.

We provide community-based services and mainly focus on "Livelihood Support" and "Education", including nutrition improvement, child care facilities upgrade, school supplies fund, holiday activities, medical care, capacity building program and community

services. In order to solve the problem of food shortage, we also help communities to establish kitchens to provide our sponsored children with diet supplements. It is our goal to ensure them to access to better environment, a chance for education and the support of better livelihood.





4. Vietnam Branch Office

Vietnam has the economic reform and opening up in recent years but it also brings many social issues and problems. Social inequalities have grown during Vietnam's transition including wealth gap, health and educational inequality. In order to help more people in need in Vietnam, TFCF Vietnam Branch Office was approved and officially established in 2014.

Vietnam Branch Office is located in Ho Chi Minh City, TFCF has provided the sponsorship program and community service in Vietnam since November 2014. By the end of December 2014, TFCF helped 127 disadvantaged children. The services provided by TFCF in Vietnam include food supply, family fund, utility fund, sanitary supply, and emergency relief fund. TFCF also provides



needy children with long-term financial assistance, nutrition, medical aid, and education support.

Independent Auditors' Report

The Board of Directors

We have audited the accompanying statement of financial position of Taiwan Fund for Children and Families (the "TFCF") as of December 31, 2014 and 2013, and the related statements of activities and cash flows for the years then ended. These financial statements are the responsibility of the TFCF management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audits.

We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the Republic of China. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audits provide a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As addressed under note 3(1) to the accompanying financial statements, the cash balances of foreign bank accounts were not reevaluated with the spot rate of December 31, 2014 and 2013; also, as addressed under notes 2(5) and 3(4), supporting documents were examined only for the acquisition costs of the land and building, while the ending balances of the land and building as of December 31, 2014 and 2013 were stated based on the assessed values and publicly announced values released either for June of year 1994 or for the acquisition year.

In our opinion, except for the effects of possible adjustments as discussed in the third paragraph, if any, that might have been determined to be necessary had the foreign currency evaluation been conducted to bank accounts and also had additional supporting documents pertinent to the ending balances of the land and building been audited, the financial statements referred to in the first paragraph present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Taiwan Fund for Children and Families as of December 31, 2014 and 2013, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the years then ended, in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the Republic of China.

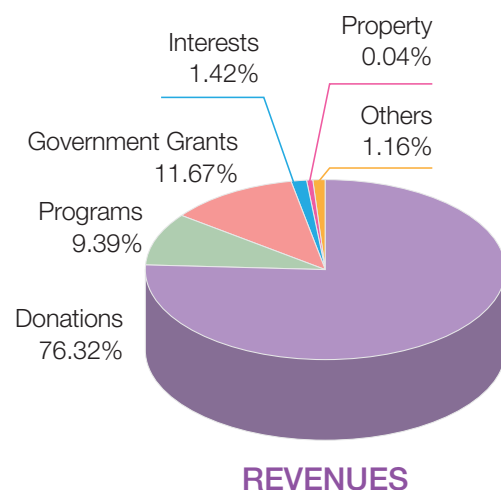

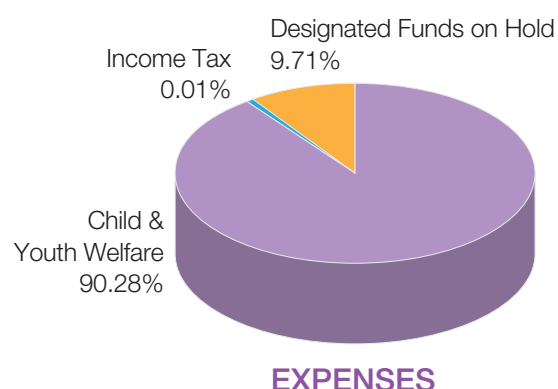
